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We'll open the prehearing conference in docket DW 06-094.

On June 22nd, 2006, Aquarion Water Company and Macquarie

Utilities, Inc. jointly filed a petition with the

Commission for approval pursuant to RSA 369:8 and RSA

374:3 of the acquisition of Aquarion by Macquarie. Order

of notice was issued on July 3 setting the prehearing

conference for this morning. We have a letter of

participation that has been filed by the Office of

Consumer Advocate. We have a Petition to Intervene by the

Town of Hampton and a Petition to Intervene by the Town of

North Hampton Water Commission.

Has the affidavit of publication been filed?

MS. BATEMAN: I have not seen it.

CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Good morning.

MR. CAMERINO: If I may, Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN GETZ: Please.

MR. CAMERINO: I have photocopies of the affidavits of publication, which were faxed to us by the two newspapers. But, because of the short timing, we won't have originals until a subsequent date. So, if you'd like, I can provide the copies to the Clerk this morning.

CHAIRMAN GETZ: If you could just take care of that after the prehearing conference, that would be sufficient. We'll begin with appearances by the parties that are here, and then we'll hear any objections to the Petitions to Intervene, and then hear the statements of the parties.

So, we'll start with you, Mr. Camerino.

MR. CAMERINO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and good morning, Commissioners. My name is Steven

Camerino, from McLane, Graf, Raulerson & Middleton, and I represent Aquarion Water Company of New Hampshire and Macquarie Utilities, Inc. And, with me this morning at counsel's table, beginning at my right, Rob Kupchak,

Associate Director of Macquarie Securities (USA), Inc; then, Don Morrissey, from Aquarion Company, Vice President of Finance and Corporate Secretary; Linda Discepolo,

Director of Rates and Regulation with Aquarion Company; and Larry Bingaman, Senior Vice President for Operations in Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good morning.

1 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Are there any objections 2 to the Petitions to Intervene? MR. CAMERINO: Just one note, Mr. 3 I don't believe we received the petition from 4 Chairman. the Town of -- from the North Hampton Water Commission. 5 6 We did receive one from the Town of Hampton. Assuming 7 that the Water Commission is seeking to intervene, we don't have an objection, but we would appreciate receiving 8 9 a copy. 10 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Mr. Fuller, 11 actually, I'd like to follow up on to make sure I 12 understand the request. Whether you're seeking to 13 intervene on behalf of the North Hampton Water Commission, 14 as has been the case in other cases, but it also suggests, 15 though, that you're trying to -- basically making a petition on behalf of the town itself. Can you clarify 16 17 that? 18 MR. FULLER: We have sent paperwork in 19 to Debby Howells (Howland?), and eight copies. We already 20 filed with her. So, -- And, our statement is that we're 21 intervening. 22 Okay. But I think the CHAIRMAN GETZ: 23 letter indicates that I quess something's being forwarded 24 to the Board of Selectmen and perhaps the Town itself may

1 intervene. Is that what you're --2 MR. FULLER: No, that's just a cc will be sent to the Town, so they know what's going on. 3 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. So, this would be 4 5 -- your intervention here would be in the nature that it has been in other cases, where you're seeking to intervene 6 7 as the Water Commission? MR. FULLER: Yes. 8 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Well, hearing no 9 objections, and recognizing that the Town of Hampton and 10 11 the Town of North Hampton Water Commission have indicated 12 rights, duties, privileges or other interests that would 13 be affected by this proceeding, we grant the motions to 14 intervene. 15 So, at this time, we'll turn to 16 statements of positions by the parties. And, 17 Mr. Camerino. 18 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. MR. CAMERINO: 19 As the petition indicates, Macquarie Utilities plans to 20 acquire Aquarion Company from Kelda, PLC. Aquarion 21 Company has utility operations in New Hampshire, 22 Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York. It also has a 23 water service line protection business. Macquarie Bank,

Limited, is a company that's listed on the Australian

Stock Exchange. It owns, develops and manages investments in infrastructure businesses that are financially stable, with -- and predictable over the long term. It has substantial experience in the utility industry. In the gas distribution industry, it has nearly 4 million households that it serves. In the water utility industry, it serves nearly 2 million households. And, in electric distribution, it serves over a half million households.

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The change of ownership from Kelda to Macquarie will not adversely affect the rates, service or operations of Aquarion New Hampshire, and it will result in no net harm to the public. And, in fact, we believe there are some benefits that will result. And, therefore, the Commission should approve the proposed transaction.

In particular, the Company has indicated in its filing that there's no intention to reduce the size of the workforce or make other changes at the operating company level. There is no intention to change the rates or service being provided as a result of the acquisition. There's no plan to change the corporate structure of Aquarion at this time. The philosophy of Macquarie is similar to that of Kelda, in terms of efficiency of operation and seeking cost savings. And, Macquarie and Aquarion believe that Macquarie's ownership will provide

excellent access to both debt and equity markets, which will create opportunities for a more efficient capital structure.

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In essence, as the petition indicates, the operations and service of Aquarion New Hampshire will remain the same after the acquisition, and, really, this is just a change at the highest ownership level of the company. The Companies are aware of the rather tight time frame that is laid out in RSA 369, with regard to merger proceedings, and are prepared to be flexible in working with the Staff and other parties to work out a schedule that meets their needs. We've indicated that the transaction is planned to close in the fourth quarter of this year. And, we understand that the discovery process that the Staff and parties need to go through may require that something more than the 60 days contemplated by the statute would be helpful. And, subject to the understanding that we would work on a fairly tight time frame, I think we don't need to be bound by that statutory time period.

With that said, we're looking forward to beginning the discovery process at the technical session and working with the Staff and the Consumer Advocate and the parties to reach a prompt resolution. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you.

Mr. Gearreald.

MR. GEARREALD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The Town of Hampton is, of course, the largest of those communities that is served by Aquarion. And, of course, there's much interest to us as to who acquires Aquarion and what their intentions are. It's been represented in, not only in the petition here, but in an earlier e-mail attached to our statement of position, that this acquisition will be a benefit to the customers of Aquarion. We'd very much like to find out what those benefits might be.

Of course, there is also, as pointed out in our statement of position, an ongoing rate issue that is, once the Commission rules upon the rate increase being sought, there is nevertheless a step increase that is likely to come forward before the Commission during the period that Macquarie is simultaneously seeking to acquire Aquarion. So, we're wondering how the benefits that are to come from Macquarie's acquisition may bear upon that step increase.

Also, there are a number of Macquarie entities here involved that are mentioned in the petition, and I think it would be important to find out exactly what

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      those entities are and how they interrelate.
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      Macquarie Infrastructure Partners, the Aquarion
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      transaction is their first investment, as is mentioned in
      Paragraph 3 of the petition. So, it's important to flesh
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      out how that works. And, we look forward to working with
      the Commission and the Consumer Advocate's office. I note

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       Recognizing that the standard for this, as I understand
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it, is the "no net harm" standard, we'd be looking at what
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      kind of quarantees Macquarie is willing to put in writing,
      quaranteeing at least today's service levels will not
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      deteriorate, that the size of the capital budget will not
      diminish, that the level of conservation will not
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      diminish. Miscellaneous things like will hydrant
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      maintenance continue at at least the same level?
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      there be at least the same level of consumer input and
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      consumer advisory council? Will local management have at
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       least the same amount of ability as they do today to make
       financial decisions? We've heard the Company say that
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       "the workforce in New Hampshire will not be reduced".
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       Will there be some kind of a limitation, will the Company
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       agree to some kind of limitation on dividends, to at least
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       maintain the capital structure as it is today, as opposed
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       to potentially harming the Company by making it more
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       risky?

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                                        Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
                         MS. THUNBERG:
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       The Staff would like to start with a bit of history with
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       respect to Aquarion. And, remind the Commission and the
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parties here today that, back on March 1st in 2002, the Commission, in Order 23,924, approved the change of control of Hampton Water Works from American Water Works to Aquarion. And, in that docket, Staff entered into a stipulation, which was approved by the Commission, and that stipulation contained a number of provisions intended to protect customer service, maintain and enhance local relationships, and integrate Aquarion's local operations and its management structure into its Connecticut offices. The signatories fully supported the stipulation at hearing. And, again, the Commission approved that.

And, in Aquarion's most recent rate case, Staff concluded that Aquarion has lived up to that stipulation. The Company is providing good water service in its franchise area. In its recent rate case, Staff and the parties are proposing only an 18.6 percent overall rate increase. And, in this day and age, with capital improvements, a 3 percent, or, actually, this amounts to just a 3 percent increase annually. And, with the capital improvements going on in water companies these days, that is almost unheard of.

Staff, in particular, would like to point out that, in the rate case, Staff determined that Aquarion's operations and maintenance expenses had

actually decreased. So, in total, Staff's position is that Aquarion has been doing a great job with this company thus far. And, with that history, and knowing that this docket is a proposed change of control at the parent level, Staff will be revisiting the issues that were in that stipulation, such as how local control will be maintained, how field operations will continue, how customer service may change under the new parent ownership. Staff will be working with Aquarion and Macquarie and other parties in this docket to answer those questions.

Aquarion has also proposed in this docket to establish a regulatory asset or liability on its books, to recognize previously unrecognized gains and losses relating to obligations for pensions and post benefits -- or post retirement benefits other than pensions. Staff will be exploring this issue fully, and will likely ask the Company to supplement the information in its petition. When Staff has this information, Staff will propose a recommendation to the Commission.

But Staff will be working with the parties and the Company in the tech session following this prehearing to develop a proposed procedural schedule that meets the time needs of Macquarie and Aquarion, but also

the Staff's and the other parties' needs to assure that there is no net harm in this transaction. Thank you. CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Is there anything else that the parties wish to bring up this morning? (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Hearing nothing, then we will close this prehearing conference and await a recommendation on procedure from the parties. Thank you very much. (Whereupon the prehearing conference ended at 9:17 a.m. and the Staff and the Parties convened a technical session thereafter.)
