The Commission approved Aquarion's schedule of WICA-related replacement projects for the year 2013 but Aquarion subsequently filed a motion to modify its 2013 schedule of projects to take advanlage of road work being done by the Town of Hampton. On January 31, 2014. Aquarion sought recovery of its 2013 WICA costs with a surcharge of 1.3788%, effeccosts with a surcharge of 1.3765%, elec-tive for service rendered on and after April 1, 2014, but it requested that the sur-charge for the 2013 WICA costs be set at zero (0.00095) on a temporary basis and that it be allowed to book a deferred asset for revenues it would have collected under the surcharge. "What's important is who's going to do what to reestablish credibility in that office, not who has tried the most cases," said Grosky, an Atkinson resident and a prosecutor with the

HAMPTON — Republican candidates for county attorney called for a need to restore the "public image" of an office mired in controversy while stumping at the first large political rally on the Seacoast on

Tuesday. Nearly all of the Republican candidates running for dis-tricts involving the Seacoast area and Hampton's state offices appeared at the Victoria Inn in Hampton Tuesday night as part of the Seacoast Republicans' event.

The four candidates seeking the GOP's primary nomination for county attorney took small jabs at each others' credentials and record while making a case for why they'd be the best to lead Rockingham County past allegations of ethical issues and misconduct within the office.

"The county attorney's office has been damaged recently,

and the professionalism of the the office. office has been slipping in re-cent years," said Mike DiCroce of Fremont, a prosecutor for area police departments who previously spent six years within the county attorney's

Attorney General Joseph Foster stripped County Attorney Jim Reams, of Hampton, of his prosecutorial powers on Nov. 6 due to an investigation into allegations that he was involved in sexual harassment and mishandling county funds. Foster won't bring criminal charges but will ask a judge during an Aug. 4 trial to remove Reams, who thanks to a Supreme Court ruling returned to work April 30 after six-month suspension, for misconduct.

DiCroce and fellow candidates Jason Grosky and Michael Zaino spoke of a need to bring someone from the outside in order to help restore residents' and victims' faith in

GOP county attorney candidates stump in Hampton

'What's important is who's going to do what to reestablish credibility in that office, not who has tried the most cases,' said Grosky, an Atkinson resident and a prosecutor with the Salem Police Department.

Zaino and Assistant County Attorney Patricia Conway, a Salem resident who is also running for Reams' post, did say that experience with the key issues plaguing Rockingham County is important, though. One of those issues, according to Zaino, is heroin, which he called a "poison" and an "epidemic.

"The next county attorney has to be prepared to take this issue on," said Zaino, a Hampton resident who has rosecuted cases for the Drug Enforcement Agency in U.S. District Court. "I am prepared to do more. It's something we

can no longer ignore."
Conway, who has been in the county attorney's office since

1999 and has been the lead prosecutor for the Seacoast area since 2003, said devotion to serving the community and an understanding of how to run the office are just as important as "passion" for the job.
"I believe we can reduce

crime and recidivism," said Conway. "I have the experi-ence to ensure all cases we get in our office are handled ethically and appropriately.

Candidates spoke for nearly two hours Tuesday in front of a group of roughly 60 residents and party members, all of whom braved temperatures in the high 40s for the outdoor event.

In addition to candidates running in local primaries like incumbent state Sen. Nancy Stiles, of Hampton, and her challenger Steve Kenda, of North Hampton, Republican candidates for governor, U.S. Senate, U.S. Congress, the state Congress, and county-level offices also spoke Tuesday.

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N.H. HOSPITALS REACH TENTATIVE TAX DEAL

Months of negotiating could end today

BY NORMA LOVE sociated Press

CONCORD — Gov. Maggie Hassan announced a tentative settlement Thursday with almost all New Hampshire hospitals over Medicaid rates and a tax on hospital revenues that has been deemed unconstitutional.

Hassan told House and Senate negotiators the agreement with 25 hospitals hinges on legislation, which they plan to finalize today, to address constitutional questions.

Under the agreement, the hospitals would get more money for the care they provide in exchange for dropping a federal lawsuit over Medic-

aid rates and putting on hold their state court challenge the tax's constitutionality. Hassan said the deal will provide stability for the state budget and the revenue used to fund state aid for the uncompensated care the hospitals provide.

Hassan, legislative leaders and the hospitals have been negotiating for several months toward a settlement over the 5.5 percent tax assessed on net patient revenues. The discussions focused on how to boost payments to the hospitals since New Hampshire's reimbursement rate for Medicaid care is about 50 percent of cost, which the hospitals argue is too low.

Under the agreement, the state's two rehabilitation hospitals would no longer pay the tax. A judge had ruled this winter that applying the tax to them was unconstitutional.

St. Joseph Hospital in Nashua, which has sued over the tax, is the only hospital that didn't join the agreement. Pamela Walsh, Hassan's chief of staff, said St. Joseph provides little charity care and thus doesn't benefit as much as other hospitals from state aid for uncompensated care.

Steve Ahnen, president of the New Hampshire Hospital Association, said the hospitals would have no comment Thursday on the announce-

The tax brings in about \$185 million a year. The agreement would have little impact on the current budget. The hospitals would get more state aid in 2016 and 2017.

In 1991, hospitals began paying the tax so the state could gain matching Medicaid funds to pay for health care for the poor. For many years, they got all their taxes refunded dollar-for-dollar.

In 2011, the federal government said states could no longer refund all the money and, instead, had to apply a formula that reimbursed the funds according to hospitals' Medicaid costs. Three years ago, the Republican-controlled Legislature cut Medicaid funding to the hospitals by more than \$130 million, but retained the tax. That prompted hospitals

city. "We are very pleased that it's gone in the direction it's gone," he said. "We look forward to working with the GSA and continuing to work with Sen. Shaheen on the transfer of the property.

Bohenko said he heard the news Thursday and plans to quickly reach out to the GSA to begin negotiations. If the city ultimately gains control of the property, the next decision will be what to do with it.
"Clearly, the City Council

will have a tremendous amount of input, which will be a key to the process," Bohenko said.

Stefany Shaheen said Thursday she was "very pleased" about the news and "the redevelopment opportunities for that location.

"We need to engage in an extensive planning process that involves the public to look at how we can maximize the property, which is one of the gateways into the city," she said of the Daniel Street building. She described the property as "one of the most valuable pieces of property not just in Portsmouth but throughout the

Asked about the role her mother's decision to reach out to the White House in an effort to get the GSA to turn the property over to the city played, Stefany Shaheen said,

"It's hard to speculate, but ultimately this kind of decision required leadership and required the willingness of the folks at GSA to take another look at their decision. I'm certainly grateful to my mom for her leadership."

Assistant Mayor Jim Splaine called the decision "excellent news" for the city and noted it was a long time coming.

"I think it's a matter now of having some brainstorming session before we get the property about what we might be able to do with the building," Splaine said. "We should start planning now while we continue to lobby the GSA about transferring the property.'

Splaine said he was con-cerned the GSA would seek a "fair market value" for the roperty, but noted the federal building location has long been promised to the city when the GSA planned to build a new facility at Pease International Tradeport.

"The fact is it's Portsmouth's land, it always has been and we should be getting it back," Splaine said.

He envisioned a host of possibilities for the property, including trying to craft a public-private partnership that could include a smaller parking garage, open space, office

space and an open market.
"We're talking about a pretty
good piece of land," he said.
