Please confirm that the Administrator of the funds must be characterized as a project "owner" (rather than serving in a contractual relationship specific to the grant).</li> <li>c. Would an individual with a minority interest in all projects in a single grant application be able to be characterized as an "owner" of all projects on which grant funds may be expended?</li> <li>d. Could a "parent company" approach be used where each of the subproject owners would in fact retain responsibility and rewards for their independent projects?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>2a. A proposal which seeks to make investments at multiple project sites where each site has different controlling interest ownership would be determined to be a non-conforming proposal.</li> <li>2b. The question posed suggests that grant funds would be used in a manner in which the grantee would act as a program administrator by expending funds on a number of individually-owned facilities. Funding such an arrangement is not permitted under the RFP.</li> <li>2c. No.</li> <li>2d. No. See response to 2b above.</li> </ul>

Please confirm that a steam-powered electric generator using steam produced through combustion of a blend of renewable processed landfill gas (PLG) and natural gas to produce electricity is eligible to participate in this RFP.	Yes. Such a proposal would be deemed to be a conforming proposal, assuming that sufficient documentation may be provided to certify the new project as a renewable energy source under RSA 362-F so that electricity generated using steam produced through combustion of a blend of renewable PLG and natural gas can be considered REC-eligible in NH.
