1	PROCEEDINGS				
2	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Good afternoon.				
3	We'll open the hearing in docket DG 08-045. By Order				
4	Number 24,850, issued April 23 this year, we approved the				
5	2008 Summer Period cost of gas rate for New Hampshire Gas				
6	Corporation. The rate was set at \$1.9720 per therm, which				
7	could be adjusted monthly without further Commission				
8	approval to a maximum rate of \$2.3664 per therm. On				
9	June 19th, New Hampshire Gas filed a revised COG,				
10	proposing that rates beginning in August would be				
11	increased to \$2.4819 per therm, with a maximum rate of				
12	\$2.9782 per therm. Supplemental order of notice was				
13	issued on June 20 setting the hearing for this afternoon.				
14	Can we take appearances please.				
15	MS. PURCELL: Good afternoon,				
16	Commissioners. Meabh Purcell, from Dewey & LeBoeuf, in				
17	Boston, representing New Hampshire Gas Corporation.				
18	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good afternoon.				
19	CMSR. MORRISON: Good afternoon.				
20	CMSR. BELOW: Good afternoon.				
21	MR. DAMON: And, good afternoon,				
22	Commissioners Edward Domon for the Staff and with me				
	Commissioners. Edward Damon, for the Staff, and with me				
23	are Robert Wyatt and Stephen Frink.

- 2 CMSR. BELOW: Good afternoon.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Anything we need to
- 4 address, before we hear from the Company's witness?
- 5 MS. PURCELL: No, I have the return of
- 6 service, which I haven't taken care of yet.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. You can just give
- 8 it to the Clerk would be fine.
- 9 MS. PURCELL: I'd like to introduce the
- 10 Company's witness, Ms. Jennifer Boucher please.
- 11 (Whereupon Jennifer M. Boucher was duly
- 12 sworn and cautioned by the Court
- 13 Reporter.)
- JENNIFER M. BOUCHER, SWORN
- 15 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 16 BY MS. PURCELL:
- 17 Q. Ms. Boucher, could you please state your full name,
- 18 your position, and your business address for the
- 19 record.
- 20 A. Certainly. My name is Jennifer Boucher. I am the
- 21 Manager of Regulatory Economics for the Berkshire Gas
- 22 Company. We provide affiliate services for New
- Hampshire Gas Corporation. And, my business address is
- 24 115 Cheshire Road, Pittsfield, Massachusetts.

## [WITNESS: BOUCHER]

- 1 Q. Thank you. Ms. Boucher, are you the same Jennifer
- Boucher who submitted the revised interim CGA rate on
- 3 behalf of New Hampshire Gas for the period August 1st
- 4 through October 31, 2008?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. And, I'm going to show you a document dated "June 19th,
- 7 2008", and ask that you identify this document.
- 8 A. That is the interim summer filing that we made on
- 9 June 19th.
- 10 MS. PURCELL: Thank you. I think the
- 11 next exhibit number, we're going to pick up where we left
- off, is going to be "New Hampshire Gas Exhibit Number 3".
- 13 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Be so marked.
- 14 (The document, as described, was
- 15 herewith marked as Exhibit 3 for
- identification.)
- 17 BY MS. PURCELL:
- 18 Q. Ms. Boucher, since your revised filing or the interim
- 19 filing on June 19th, which is Company Exhibit 3, have
- 20 you made any revisions to the proposed CGA rate to
- 21 reflect updated information?
- 22 A. Yes, I have. The price of propane has increased since
- the Company's filing on June 19th. So, we made a
- 24 subsequent filing yesterday with the increase to

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- 1 commodity prices.
- 2 Q. And, actually, to be more specific, we didn't file --
- 3 you didn't file that with the Commission, you just made
- 4 -- you gave a copy to Staff, is that correct?
- 5 A. That's correct.
- 6 MS. PURCELL: And, I have copies for all
- 7 of the Commissioners that we would mark as "New Hampshire
- 8 Gas Exhibit Number 4".
- 9 CHAIRMAN GETZ: So marked.
- 10 (The document, as described, was
- 11 herewith marked as Exhibit 4 for
- identification.)
- 13 BY MS. PURCELL:
- 14 Q. Ms. Boucher, were the documents that have been marked
- for identification purposes prepared by you or under
- 16 your direct supervision?
- 17 A. Yes, they were.
- 18 Q. And, where in the filing that has now been marked as
- 19 "New Hampshire Gas Exhibit Number 4" can we find the
- 20 Company's revised CGA rate that would be in effect
- 21 August 1st?
- 22 A. On the first page of Exhibit 4 is the calculation of
- 23 the cost of gas rate. Towards the bottom of the page
- 24 the line is labeled "Revised Cost of Gas Rate Effective

1 August 1st, 2008", and the rate is "2.8318 per therm".

2 O. Okay. I'm sorry. When you said -- did you mean -- you

- 3 didn't mean the first page of the exhibit, you meant
- 4 the -- the first page of Exhibit 4 is the testimony.
- 5 You meant the attachments, is that --
- 6 A. I'm sorry. I'm not sure what page it is in Exhibit 4,
- 7 because I don't have it labeled, but it's the first
- 8 page with calculations on it that's labeled at the top
- 9 "Calculation of the Cost of Gas Rate". It's labeled
- 10 "36th Revised Page 25" in the upper right-hand corner.
- 11 O. Okay. I think that's fine. Thanks. And, Ms. Boucher,
- 12 could you explain the derivation of the cost of gas
- 13 rate and explain the reasons for the increase that
- 14 prompted the Company to make this interim CGA filing.
- 15 A. Certainly. As of July 1st, the Company increased its
- 16 cost of gas rate to the maximum allowable rate of
- 17 2.3664. If I could ask you to turn to Attachment A of
- 18 the calculation of the cost of gas rate, the title of
- 19 the page is called "New Hampshire Gas Corporation
- 20 Actual-Over/Under Calculation May 2008 through
- 21 October 2008 with Maximum COG Rate as Approved in DG
- 22 08-045". At the bottom right-hand corner of this page,
- 23 numbered Line 10, "Final-Over/Under Collection", if the
- 24 Company's cost of gas rate remained at 2.3664, the

- 1 Company estimates that the undercollection at October
- 2 31st would be \$61,547. In order to alleviate this
- 3 undercollection, the Company divided this
- 4 undercollection by the anticipated billing determinants
- 5 from August 1st through October 31st, which are 131,740
- 6 therms, to arrive at the number on the first page of
- the Calculation of the Cost of gas Rates, entitled "Mid
- 8 Period Rate Adjustment 8-01-08", this amount is "46.54"
- 9 cents" per therm. And, when added to the maximum cost
- of gas rate of 2.3664, it arrives at the 2.8318 per
- 11 therm proposed rate for August 1st, 2008.
- 12 Q. Thank you. Ms. Boucher, have you done any analysis of
- 13 the impact of the proposed rate on a typical customer
- 14 bill for the period that's remaining from the last
- three months of this Summer CGA?
- 16 A. Yes. In this exhibit, on Attachment D, in the lower
- 17 right-hand of the page, the line is entitled "Seasonal
- 18 Total Bill Difference", and it's expected that the
- 19 customer bill impact from this change will be \$29 for
- the remainder of the period.
- 21 Q. Thank you. Ms. Boucher, do you have anything else to
- 22 add at this time?
- 23 A. No, I don't.
- 24 MS. PURCELL: Thank you. The Company {DG 08-045} (07-15-08)

1 has no further questions. Ms. Boucher is available.

- 2 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Mr. Damon.
- 3 MR. DAMON: Thank you.
- 4 CROSS-EXAMINATION
- 5 BY MR. DAMON:
- 6 Q. Turning to the page in the filing Exhibit 4, Tariff
- 7 Page 25, the Staff understands that the propane cost
- 8 reflected on this page of \$646,682 actually has been
- 9 adjusted since the original filing, is that correct?
- 10 A. That's correct. The "646,682" number was the figure
- 11 from the original April filing. The new number for the
- total anticipated cost of propane is \$732,047. And,
- that's shown on Attachment A, Line 7.
- 14 Q. Great. Thank you. And, in addition, the summer period
- cost per therm of what I understand is \$2.1452, as
- shown on Schedule A, Line 6, does not appear on the
- 17 tariff Page either, is that correct?
- 18 A. That's correct. The same line that showed the cost
- 19 should also be updated to show the new projected cost
- 20 per therm of \$2.1452.
- 21 Q. Okay. And, the volumes, are they any different? In
- the original filing, I believe it was "355,105"?
- 23 A. Those have been revised downward to 341,241 therms.
- 24 And, the reason for that is that we have some actual

experience. We have the actual propane sendout from

- 2 May through June, and then we have estimates for the
- 3 remainder of the period.
- 4 Q. And, based on this proceeding today, presuming the
- 5 Commission approves the rate revisions, would the
- 6 Company be willing to update the tariff page to show
- 7 the correct numbers when it submits its compliance
- 8 filing with the Commission?
- 9 A. Certainly. Certainly.
- 10 MR. DAMON: I have no further questions.
- 11 BY CMSR. BELOW:
- 12 Q. Just a slight clarification. On Attachments A and B,
- 13 the title starts "Actual-Over/Under Collection May 2008
- 14 through October 2008". As you just noted, several of
- 15 those months haven't occurred yet. So, wouldn't this
- better be described as "Estimated" or "Projected
- 17 over/under collection"?
- 18 A. It would be. Typically, above the months we would have
- 19 the terms "actual", "forecasted" or "estimated", and
- those are missing off of the sheet. So, you're
- 21 correct.
- 22 Q. Okay. Thank you. But they are your best estimate for
- 23 what the actual cost of gas is going to be in those
- 24 future months, is that correct?

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[WITNESS: BOUCHER]

- 1 A. That's correct.
- 2 CMSR. BELOW: Okay.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Ms. Purcell, is there
- 4 anything further?
- 5 MS. PURCELL: No, I think that's it.
- 6 BY CHAIRMAN GETZ:
- 7 Q. Well, I guess one question that does occur to me is
- 8 what types of contacts have there been with customers
- 9 about these potential increases?
- 10 A. Well, certainly, the Company is receiving numerous
- inquiries into the winter heating season price.
- Because propane is primarily used by residential
- customers during the summer period for cooking or water
- 14 heating, customers' bills have not risen dramatically
- 15 with these increases. But, certainly, there have been
- a lot of inquiries into the price this winter, and the
- 17 Company has been forecasting what its price will be and
- 18 telling customers of that. And, as we approach the
- 19 heating season and have a better gauge of what the
- 20 price will actually be, we will initiate communications
- 21 with the customers.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GETZ: All right. Is there
- 23 anything further for this witness?
- MS. PURCELL: No, I don't think so.

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CHAIRMAN GETZ: Hearing nothing, then
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       you're excused. Thank you very much. Is there any
 3
       objection to striking the identification and entering the
 4
       exhibits into evidence?

                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Hearing no objection,

                         MR. DAMON: Thank you. The Staff has
10
       reviewed the revised Summer Period 2008 filing with the
       updated costs. And, as Staff noted this morning, energy
11
       costs are climbing faster than reasonable forecasts can
12

      keep pace with. And, approving the increase now will help
14
       avoid a potential undercollection, which, in many
       respects, is undesirable. Also, given the extensive
15
      publicity related to the extreme run-up in energy costs
16
       this summer, the proposed increase in the summer cost of
17
       gas rates at this time, while not welcomed, should be
18
19
       understood by customers.
                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Ms. Purcell.

                         MS. PURCELL: Thank you. The Company
22
       just wants to thank the Commission and the Commission
23
       Staff for their assistance and cooperation in resolving
       this interim rate filing. And, we just look forward to
