Aquarion Water Company of New Hampshire, Inc. (Aquarion), seeks approval of a nechanism to peas through to customers an anticipated tax benefit in the approximate mount of \$905,000 dollars. Aquarion proposes to net out deferred revenues from the delayed application of its 2014 Water Infrastructure and Conservation Adjustment amount of \$905,000 column. Assume the delayed application of its 2014 Water Infrastructure and Conservation Augustian (WICA) surcharge. Aquarion proposes to apply a credit to customer bills beginning January 1, 2015, and continuing for a three-year period. The petition and subsequent docket filings, other than any infromation for which confidential treatment is requested of or granted by the Commission, is posted to the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission website at http://www.puc.nh.gov/Regulstory/Docketbk/2013/13-314.html.

In September 2103, the United States Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service (IRS) adopted regulations that allow taxpayers to expense certain repair and mistreasure costs that Aquarion that historically capitalized. The regulations permit Aquarion to reflect a catch-up adjustment on its 2013 federal tax return, limited to the amount of state and federal taxes paid by Aquarion in 2011 through 2013. Aquarion calculates that its taxes for that period will equal \$905,000 dollars. Aquarion will therefore be able to take advantage of a \$905,000 adjustment by expensing capital improvements that it made during 2007 through 2013. To pass through this benefit to its customers, Aquarion proposes to creste a deferred regulatory liability. It would first offset the regulatory liability with an estimated \$71,766 in 2014 WICA revenues that have been accruing sime April 1, 2014, but which have not yet been collected in rates. Aquarion would then pass through the remainder of the tax benefit to its customers through an estimated 4% credit on customer bills beginning January 1, 2015. Aquarion requests a period of three-years for the credit. mests a period of three-years for the credit.





In September 2103, the United States Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service (IRS) adopted regulations that allow taxpayers to expense certain repair and maintenance costs that Aquarion bas historically expitalized. The regulations permit Aquarion to reflect a catch-up edjustment on its 2013 federal tax return, limited to the amount of state and federal taxes paid by Aquasiron in 2011 through 2013. Aquarion calculates that its taxes for that period will equal \$905,000 dollars. Aquarion will therefore be able to take advantage of a \$905,000 adjustment by expensing capital improvements that it made during 2007 through 2013. To pass through this benefit to its customers, Aquarion proposes to create a deferred regulatory liability. It would first offiset the regulatory liability with an estimated \$71,766 in 2014 WICA revenues that have been secreting since April 1, 2014, but which have not yet been collected in rates. Aquarion would then pass drough the remainder of the tax benefit to its customers through an estimated 4% credit on customer bills beginning Jamusry 1, 2015. Aquarion requests a period of three-years for the credit.

OFFICIALS: LAWS ADDRESS COLLEGE SEXUAL ASSAULTS

HANOVER — Federal education and Justice Department officials speaking at a Dartmouth College summit on sexual assault said Monday they are open to the idea of new legislation to address the issue but already have effective tools

at their disposal.

Representatives from more than 60 colleges and universi-ties are attending this week's conference at Dartmouth, one of 55 colleges and universities being investigated by the federal Education Department for how it handles sexual harass-ment and assault complaints. Participants on Monday heard from Catherine Lhamon, the Education Department's assistant secretary for civil rights, and Anurima Bhargava from the Justice Department's division of civil rights.

The Education Department

and a White House task force on campus sexual assault have taken a series of steps to draw attention to the treatment of

force campuses to address the problem. Meanwhile, Sen. Claire McCaskill, D-Mo., and other senators are exploring legislative ways to empower victims, simplify laws and rules colleges and universities follow, and find ways that campuses and local authorities can better coordinate. "I'm open and enthusiastic

about what may be forthcoming, but where I sit today, I think we have a set of very, very effective tools," Lhamon said, denying an audience member's suggestion that current laws lack teeth. Those tools include the threat of litigation and the po-

tential loss of federal funding for not complying with Title IX, which prohibits gender dis-crimination, and Lhamon said four schools have come close to the latter sanction in the last 10 months.

"I don't think it is an empty threat," she said. "If a school is told that it is not compliant with Title IX in any respect and refuses to come into compli-


