As a resident who has invested in solar power, I'm urging you to continue the current system of compensating customers for the energy these panels contribute to the grid. This solar power is generated locally, which means that we need to import that much less power. Solar panels are also installed locally, so they create jobs for NH. Another benefit to the current net metering: rooftop solar doesn't create particulate matter like when fossil fuels are burned. Because of this, net metering reduces medical costs here in NH and improves the health of residents. Since in the future, we can expect increased demand due to more EVs and heat pumps, this would seem to be very important.

Net metering encourages residents to install solar panels. Without it, these benefits will be reduced more than if we continue with the current system. Please keep the current net metering system so we can encourage more residents to install solar panels. NH has so much to gain.
