9	Motion Requesting to Submit and Exhibit Video Evidence
10	
11	NOW COMES Karen Steele, a party to this proceeding, and moves to request the permission to
12	submit and exhibit video evidence for the hearing on October 11, 2023. In support of the motion, the
13	Karen Steele states as follows:
14	
15	I. BACKGROUND
16	For Docket DW 20-117, there was a Hearing on Hampstead Area Water Company's (HAWC) Step
17	1 Permanent Rate Increase on April 12, 2023. On, April 28, 2023, the PUC issued Order No. 26,809
18	approving the Step 1 increase request. On May 15, 2023, Intervenor Karen Steele submitted a
19	Motion for Rehearing indicating that the PUC failed to address 2 grievances:
20	1) Based on HAWC's own reported data to NH DES, the MSDC spend of \$892,500 is not
20	I) Based on HAWC'S OWN reported data to NH DES, the MSDC spend of \$692,500 is not
21	used and useful and thus HAWC should not be allowed to use that full spend amount as
22	justification to increase ratepayers' permanent rates as requested.
23	2) HAWC is not honoring their agreement to purchase and sell 250,000 gallons of water
24	per day from MWW before selling Atkinson's groundwater.

25	On June 14, 2023, the PUC issued Order No. 26,846 Order of Suspension of Order No. 26,809,
26	and on August 16, 2023, PUC issued Order No. 26,874 Denying Ms. Steele's Motion for Rehearing of
27	Order No. 26,809 indicating that "DES is the agency with clear jurisdiction to create and enforce the
28	terms of the SIA (Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Interconnection Project Agreement)."
29	Moving to Docket DW 23-020, HAWC's Step 2 Permanent Rate Increase, the PUC issued a
30	Procedural Order Re: Rescheduling Hearing, Taking Administrative Notice of Prior Testimony,
31	Requesting DES Attendance at Hearing, and Data Request on September 12, 2023. The PUC is
32	requesting DES attendance "to provide testimony concerning the terms of the Interconnection
33	Agreement and the MSDC Agreement. The nature of these agreements, and the requirements they
34	impose on HAWC, were the subject of discussion in the step adjustment proceeding in Docket No.
35	DW 20-117."

Three weeks prior, on March 19, 2019, the League of Women Voters-Southern Rockingham County hosted an informational event on the Southern NH Regional Water Interconnect Project at Kimball Library in Atkinson, NH which was recorded by the Town of Hampstead. Erin Holmes, P.E., from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) and Senator Chuck Morse,

48 Charlie Lanza, referred to the agreement requiring HAWC to purchase and sell 250,000 gallons of 49 pipeline water before selling water from their wells. When asked about what will happen to 50 HAWC's existing wells, Charlie Lanza responded "That 250,000 gallons a day is gonna be prioritized, 51 meaning that the agreement with the state specifies that that water has to be used up front prior to 52 using our own sources." 53 This video evidence clearly shows what HAWC, DES and the Drinking Water Trust believed to be 54 the requirements and obligations of the pipeline agreement. The event was one stop on their 55 "roadshow" to communicate about the pipeline project, and the benefits. It was stated by all 3 56 parties that Atkinson- Hampstead Core will be getting 250,000 gallons per day of pipeline water 57 before they used any water from their wells located in Atkinson or Hampstead. This was promoted 58 as a benefit of the pipeline to the towns and residents of both Atkinson and Hampstead. 59 As a reminder, all the other towns impacted in this pipeline project had a voice and vote, except 60 for the Towns of Atkinson and Hampstead. The Towns of Atkinson and Hampstead would be most 61 injured by HAWC not complying with the 250,000 gallon per day requirement, and yet these towns have no authority to file a dispute since they are not signers of the agreement. This is why it is 62 63 critical that both the PUC and the DES clarify HAWC's obligations and provide an escalation path for the Towns of Atkinson and Hampstead should they need to file a complaint or a dispute. 64 65 Given the Commission's Procedural Order issued on September 12, 2023, which includes a 66 request that DES attend the October 11, 2023 hearing to provide testimony concerning the terms of 67 the Interconnection Agreement and the MSDC Agreement, Intervenor Karen Steele respectfully

68 submits that the recording of the March 19, 2019 event contains vital evidence to help the PUC and

69 DES to address and answer these questions.

- 71 Senator Chuck Morse and HAWC General Manager Charlie Lanza at Atkinson's Kimball Library on

- 74 Video section #1 starts at 31:26 and ends at 31:57 (31 seconds)
- 75 ERIN HOLMES: "So, just some final thoughts, ya know the project is providing reliable water. It's
- 76 providing capacity where it's limited right now. And it's gonna be bringing clean drinking water to the
- 77 doorsteps of all the partners in this project: Plaistow, it's coming there. Um, Hampstead Area Water
- 78 Company are gonna have 250,000 dollars, 250,000 gallons per day, extra capacity coming into their
- 79 borders. Salem as well. And Windham who hasn't had this opportunity is getting 200,000 into their

80 doorstep."

81 Video section #2 starts at 33:37 and ends at 34:30 (53 seconds)

82 SENATOR CHUCK MORSE: "Just a couple of things to note, especially if you're in Hampstead and

- 83 Atkinson. We certainly, ya know if we were in Salem, we'd tune this to a different direction, but um,
- 84 250,000 gallons per day is what is scheduled in the first phase to come into this area. The usage in this
- area is 500,000 per day, on the, on the biggest day. So that's a significant purchase. In the future, I
- think you are tuned up to 500,000, um, as the max? (Erin, off camera says "750"). We had 750 on one
- 87 option... I'm not sure. But.. the reality is what you're using today will be matched by this project when
- 88 phase 2 comes in. um, that's significant. Cuz there's no other way to get that kind of water without
- 89 going into the ground with wells and I'm sure everyone has concerns about that."
- 90 Video section #3 starts at 58:00 and ends at 59:38 (1 minute, 38 seconds)
- AUDIENCE MEMBER: "Chuck, what happens to the existing HAWC wells once this system goes intoplay?"

93 SENATOR MORSE: "I can't answer that. Do you wanna answer that?"

94	MR. CHARLIE LANZA: "Yeah, uh, I mean I can, Charlie Lanza with Hampstead Water. I can try to uh give			
95	you an idea of what we envision. So, right now, we're expecting 250,000 gallons a day to come through			
96	this phase 1 of the regional interconnection. Um, so that'll be 250,000 gallons a day that we won't be			
97	producing out of our wells. That 250,000 gallons a day is gonna be prioritized, meaning that the			
98	agreement with the state specifies that that water has to be used up front prior to using our own			
99	sources. So, Chuck mentioned earlier, uh Senator Morse rather, our average daily demand right now in			
100	Atkinson and Hampstead is a little bit shy of a half million gallons a day. So, this allocation under phase			
101	1 for us is approximately 50%"			
102	AUDIENCE MEMBER: "Can you speak louder?"			
103	MR. CHARLIE LANZA: (takes microphone) "So our allocation of 250,000 gallons per day is approximately			
104	50% of the entire Atkinson and Hampstead average daily (inaudible). So, with that said, we'll have			
105	250,000 gallons a day coming out of our existing sources that no longer will come out of our sources.			
106	How exactly that will be spread out is to be determined. I can't tell you right now exactly ya know which			
107	source will be turned off or turned down. I mean, initially, it makes sense to us that we would take the			
108	ones that are lower producing, lower quality and take those offline first. But I can't tell you exactly			
109	which ones."			
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111 III. CONCLUSION

112For the reasons stated herein, Intervenor Karen Steele respectfully requests that the113Commission grant the request to submit and exhibit video evidence. This request includes the114March 19, 2019 recording in its entirety (1 hour, 50 minutes and 36 seconds), to be able to play and

115	use snippets from this recording in the	presentation of facts, and to	use snippets from the recordin	۱Ø
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to support cross examination.

Recognizing the logistics involved with video evidence at a hearing, Intervenor Karen Steele is			
open to the option of using a PUC Court Reporter, an unbiased party, to transcribe the video			
provided by the Town of Hampstead and to have the Commission accept that transcript as an			
exhibit for the hearing on October 11, 2023.
