# Petition For Intervention of The Way Home

Petitioner, The Way Home, petitions for leave to intervene in this proceeding, pursuant to Puc 203.02 and RSA 541-A:32, and states as follows:

The Way Home is located at 214 Spruce Street, Manchester, New Hampshire
 03103. The Executive Director of The Way Home is Mary Sliney. The Director of
 Housing Services is Diane Pitts.

2. The Way Home is a non-profit section 501(c)(3) organization. The Way Home was incorporated in New Hampshire in 1989 and is registered with and in good standing with the Office of the Secretary of State. The Way Home is funded in part by the Heritage United Way and by other grants.

3. The Way Home is a commercial electric customer of Public Service Company of New Hampshire (PSNH).

4. The mission of The Way Home is to help low income households obtain and maintain safe, affordable housing and prevent homelessness in New Hampshire. The Way Home provides housing services to low income individuals and families in the Manchester area, including education, housing and budget counseling, security deposit guarantees, special grants to prevent homelessness, community advocacy, mediation services, and lead paint hazard reduction. Attached to this Petition is a brochure describing some of the programs and services of The Way Home.

5. During the past 18 years over 5,000 families and individuals have been housed with the help of programs of The Way Home.

6. The Way Home also owns and provides seven units of transitional housing for low income families. These seven units use electricity provided by PSNH.

7. Due to their low incomes, clients of The Way Home are or may be eligible for and/or participate in rate payer funded electric energy efficiency programs, including the 2007 statewide Core electric energy efficiency programs.

8. The Way Home, clients of The Way Home, and the families who reside in the transitional housing units of The Way Home have an interest in this proceeding and in the design of electric energy efficiency programs, including ratemaking practices to promote energy efficiency.

9. The Way Home is currently a full party intervenor in DE 06-135, the 2007 Core Electric Energy Efficiency Programs, DG 06-032, KeySpan Energy Delivery New England, Demand Side Management and Market Transformation Plan, May 1, 2006 through April 30, 2009, and DE 06-079, the 2006-07 low income Electric Assistance Program docket.

10. The rights, duties, privileges and other substantial interest of The Way Home, its clients, and families who reside in its transitional housing units may be affected by this proceeding.

11. The Way Home seeks the status of full party intervenor in this proceeding.

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12. The granting of this petition will not impair the prompt and orderly conduct of this proceeding, will not result in delay, and will not prejudice the interest of any party.

13. The interests of justice will be promoted by allowing the intervention of The Way Home in this proceeding.

Wherefore, The Way Home requests that the Commission grant its request for leave to intervene as a full party intervenor in this proceeding.
