ORDER OF NOTICE

On March 15, 2010, Northern Utilities, Inc. (Northern) filed with the Commission its Cost of Gas (COG) rates for the period May 1, 2010 through October 31, 2010 (2010 Summer Season). Included in the filing were revised tariff pages and supporting materials for the changed rates. The petition and subsequent docket filings, other than information for which confidential treatment is requested of or granted by the Commission, will be posted to the Commission website at

<http://www.puc.nh.gov/Regulatory/Docket/2010/10-050.htm>.

The proposed residential COG rate is \$0.6981 per therm, a \$0.0817 per therm decrease from the weighted residential COG rate of \$0.7798 per therm for last summer. The estimated impact of the proposed firm sales COG and current LDAC rate on a typical residential heating customer's summer bill is a decrease of approximately \$25, or 6%.

The proposed commercial/industrial low winter use COG is \$0.6571 per therm and the proposed commercial/industrial high winter use COG is \$0.7296 per therm. The rate decrease for the commercial/industrial customers over the comparable 2009 Summer Season rates is commensurate with the residential COG rate decrease.

The filing raises, inter alia, issues related to: RSA 378 relative to the justness and reasonableness of rates, forecasting of sales, supplier prices and transportation prices, purchasing decisions related to the current and past summer supplies and capacity, cost allocations between the New Hampshire and Maine divisions, the causes and treatment of any over and under recoveries, the reconciliation of prior period costs and revenues, and rate impacts. Each party has the right to have an attorney represent them at their own expense.

Based upon the foregoing, it is hereby

ORDERED, that a hearing be held before the Commission located at 21 S. Fruit St., Suite 10, Concord, New Hamp-

shire on April 13, 2010 at 10:00 a.m.; and it is

Rules Puc 203.12; Northern shall notify all persons desiring to be heard at this hearing by publishing a copy of this Order of Notice no later than March 23, 2010, in a newspaper with general circulation in those portions of the state in which operations are conducted, publication to be documented by affidavit filed with the Commission on or before April 13, 2010; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that pursuant to N.H. Admin. Rules Puc 203.17, any party seeking to intervene in the proceeding shall submit to the Commission seven copies of a Petition to Intervene with copies sent to Northern and the Office of the Consumer Advocate on or before April 8, 2010, such Petition stating the facts demonstrating how its rights, duties, privileges, immunities or other substantial interest may be affected by the proceeding, as required by N.H. Admin. Rule Puc 203.17 and RSA 541-A:32.(b); and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that any party objecting to a Petition to Intervene make said Objection on or before April 13, 2010.

Bridge

It is certainly not difficult to beat five spades on this deal if you see all four hands. West leads his singleton diamond, and declarer plays a trump at trick two. West takes the ace, returns a club to his partner's ace and ruffs the diamond return to put the contract down one.

But in real life, this defense is not so easy to find. If West doesn't see his partner's hand, he's far more likely to try to put East on lead with a heart at

trick three, because East raised hearts during the bidding. And if West did lead a heart instead of a club, it would prove fatal, since declarer would then lose only a spade and a club and so make the contract.

The question, therefore, is how can West know to lead a club at trick three rather than a heart? The answer is that to solve problems of this sort, the defenders must make use of a weapon generally referred to as a suit-preference signal.

When West leads his singleton diamond — which is very easy for East to recognize as a singleton — East can identify his entry card by the size of the diamond he plays on dummy's ace.

Since East's entry card is in clubs, the lower-ranking of the two remaining suits aside from diamonds and spades, he should play his lowest diamond, the deuce, on the ace. By the same token, if East had the ace of hearts, he would drop the jack of diamonds under the ace to ask for a heart return. High asks for high, low asks for low — that's all there is to it.


