Resident sues town over snow plowing contract

Injunction sought; Suit alleges Richmond selectmen did not choose lowest qualified bidder.

RICHMOND — A resident suing the board of selectmen over how the winter highway maintenance contract was awarded has filed a preliminary injunction in an attempt to prevent the town from consummating the agreement.
