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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 I'd like CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: to open the hearing in Docket DW 12-085, 3 which is Aquarion Water Company of New 4 5 Hampshire's request for permanent increase in its rates, with an increase of 6 7 18.3 percent if approved as filed. Aquarion has also asked for a change of its Water 8 Infrastructure and Conservation Adjustment 9 Pilot Program to become a permanent program, 10 11 and it asked for authorization to recover a new right-of-way tax in the town of Hampton. 12 13 There's also a request for temporary rates, but that won't be taken up today. And by 14 order dated July 12, 2012, the Commission 15 16 scheduled this prehearing conference and required publication of notice of the 17 18 request. So let's begin with 19 20 appearances, please. 21 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you. 22 Patrick Taylor from McLane, Graf, Raulerson 23 & Middleton, representing Aquarion Water Company. With me today is Harry Hibbard 24 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 from the Company, Troy Dixon, Carl McMorran and Cam Knowlton, as well as Steve Camerino 2 from my firm. 3 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: 4 Good 5 morning. Welcome. MS. HOLLENBERG: Good morning. 6 7 Rorie Hollenberg and Donna McFarland here for the Office of Consumer Advocate. 8 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Good 9 morning. 10 MR. GERREALD: 11 Good morning. Mark Gerreald. I'm the town attorney for 12 13 the Town of Hampton. And with me is Selectman Michael Pierce. 14 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Welcome. 15 16 MS. THUNBERG: Good morning, 17 Commissioners. Marcia Thunberg on behalf of Staff. With me today is Mark Naylor, Jayson 18 LaFlamme and Jim Lenihan. 19 I'd also like to take this 20 21 moment to recognize Doug Brogan is with us 22 for a few more weeks until he retires, and want to publicly thank him for all his years 23 of service. 24

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1 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: We don't usually start out our prehearing conferences 2 with a tear in our eye. But it's a sad 3 piece of news, but we're glad for you, Doug. 4 All right. I think -- do we 5 have procedural matters before we take up 6 7 notices of -- I mean, excuse me, statements of position? I know we have one request to 8 intervene from the Town. Do we have any 9 objections to the request to intervene? 10 11 MS. THUNBERG: No objection from Staff. 12 13 MS. HOLLENBERG: No objection. 14 MR. TAYLOR: No objection. CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: 15 The 16 Commissioners have reviewed the request and 17 find it appropriate, meets the standards of 541-A, and we will grant the request to 18 19 intervene. 20 MR. GERREALD: Thank you. 21 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Are there 22 any other procedural issues? Do we have an 23 affidavit of publication on the notice? MR. TAYLOR: Yes, that's been 24

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1 submitted. 2 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Great. Thank you. 3 All right. Then I think it's 4 just an opportunity for people to give their 5 preliminary positions on the filing itself 6 7 and then anything that you think you need Commission's assistance on. 8 If not, then we will send you off to work on a technical 9 conference to work up a schedule and begin 10 the process of discovery on the materials. 11 12 So, Mr. Taylor. 13 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you. On May 14th, 2012, Aquarion filed a request for 14 permanent rate increase of \$1,113,931 in 15 16 annual revenues based on December 31st, 2011 17 test year. This is approximately an overall increase of 18.3 percent. Aquarion is also 18 19 seeking temporary rates, providing an 20 increase of \$732,078 in annual revenues, which is an overall increase of 21 22 approximately 12.03 percent. The Company is proposing that the increase requested in 23 this case be applied on an across-the-board 24 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 basis, so the percentage increase will be the same for all classes of customers. 2 Aquarion filed this case 3 because it is achieving a rate of return on 4 equity well below what the Commission 5 authorized in the Company's last general 6 7 rate case. Specifically, the Company's 8 return on equity for the test year ending December 31st, 2011, was 3.86 percent, 9 almost 600 basis points below the currently 10 11 allowed return of 9.75 percent. I would also note that for the 12 months ending 12 June 30th, 2012, the ROE is down to 2.5 13 14 percent. And I just offer that for illustrative purposes. The Company is 15 16 requesting an overall rate of return of 7.87 percent in this case, with a 10.25 17 return on equity. 18 Numerous factors contribute to 19 20 the Company's need to file this rate case. 21 Most notably, the Company's experienced a 22 steady increase in maintenance and operating expenses, as well as dramatically increased 23 24 property and right-of-way taxes assessed by 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 the communities that it services. Taxes alone represent approximately 16 percent of 2 the increase being sought in this case. 3 Aquarion is also seeing a 4 general decline in consumption by its 5 customers, and actual consumption has been 6 7 consistently below the level of sales volume used to calculate the rates established in 8 the Company's last general rate case. 9 This is largely attributable to the prevalence of 10 11 efficient appliances and conservation awareness and is a trend that is likely to 12 13 continue. As a result, the Company has experienced a sustained reduction in 14 revenues. 15 16 Aquarion is also making proposals relative to its Water 17 Infrastructure and Conservation Adjustment 18 or WICA Program, which this Commission 19 20 approved on a pilot basis in the Company's 21 last rate case. This program was 22 implemented to allow the Company to replace aging infrastructure in a timely and 23 cost-effective manner and recover the cost 24 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 via a surcharge. Aquarion believes the WICA Program has provided a significant benefit 2 to the Company and its customers and 3 requests that it be continued on an 4 indefinite basis so that the Company can 5 continue to improve its infrastructure on an 6 7 accelerated basis. Thank you. 8 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Thank you. Ms. Hollenberg or Ms. McFarland. 9 10 MS. McFARLAND: Ms. Hollenberg 11 had to step out for a moment. 12 The Office of Consumer 13 Advocate takes no position at this time on 14 any of the issues, and we would look forward to working with the parties. 15 16 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Thank you. 17 Mr. Gerreald. MR. GERREALD: 18 Thank you. This is a matter in which not only a 19 20 double-digit permanent rate increase is 21 sought, but also a double-digit temporary 22 increase. The Town of Hampton has been 23 involved in a number of these matters over 24 the years as an intervenor and noted the 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 history of rate increases before this Commission. The frequency of the rate cases 2 is increasing. This particular rate 3 increase in 2012 had been preceded by one 4 that was granted for double digits back in 5 2009 of 17.44 percent; prior to that, in the 6 7 year 2006, 18.64 percent. So, it looks like 8 a pattern is being sought to be established of a three-year increment; whereas, prior to 9 that, prior to the 2006 increase, the prior 10 one was in the year 2000, six years before, 11 in DW 99-057; prior to that, the previous 12 rate increase was in 1992, eight years, in 13 DR 91-0123. 14 So we now are experiencing a 15 frequency -- a greater frequency in rate 16 17 increases. And the WICA charge, which was supposed to decrease -- was designed as a 18 19 pilot program to decrease the frequency of rate increases and to ameliorate rate shock

20 rate increases and to ameliorate rate shock 21 is not accomplishing that purpose. We have 22 seen, since the 2009-ordered rate increase, 23 every year a WICA charge, first of 24 1.57 percent in 2010, which is DW 10-293,

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1 and 3.7269 percent in 2011, in DW 11-238. So we are now, despite having those 2 increases since the last rate case in 2006, 3 seeing yet another attempt to get a 4 5 double-digit rate increase, approaching 20 percent. This is in a climate where 6 7 our -- the consumers, 76 percent of whom are 8 in Hampton, are suffering to keep jobs and keep property, much less to provide a rate 9 of return of 10-plus percent. 10 11 The Company, in its temporary rate increase petition, on Page 2, says that 12 the continuation of current rates will 13 result in the confiscation of the Company's 14 property. I would suggest to you that the 15 rate of return -- the increased rate of 16 return that's being sought would be 17 confiscatory of the consumers involved who 18 19 have already paid rate increases in each of 20 the last two years. There is an attempt at 21 justification here, that the biggest driver 22 of this is the taxes that are being paid to all the communities. I would suggest to you 23 that the documents being submitted belie 24

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1 that, and the biggest percentage of the increase being sought is the 66 percent in 2 I would submit to you 3 operating expenses. that those should be very closely examined 4 in the coming weeks to see what is the 5 driver behind those and as to whether the 6 7 consumer should be tagged to pay for them. Finally, regarding the WICA 8 charge, that was a pilot program, and that's 9 being sought to be implemented on a 10 11 permanent basis. Again, the purposes for 12 which that was sought, decreasing the frequency of rate increases and ameliorating 13 14 rate shock, are not doing what they were supposed to do. And we would suggest that 15 before that program is ever thought to be 16 17 made permanent, that it be re-examined to see if such a program is fulfilling its 18 And on behalf of the Town of 19 purposes. 20 Hampton Board of Selectmen, one of whom is 21 here, I'm authorized to vigorously oppose 22 these rate increases. Thank you so much. 23 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Thank you. 24 Ms. Thunberg.

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1 MS. THUNBERG: Good morning, Staff just wanted to note 2 Commissioners. that in the past rate cases, Town of Rye and 3 the Town of North Hampton and the North 4 Hampton Water Precinct have participated. 5 Ι note that they have not formally intervened 6 7 here today. But in talking with the 8 Company, I'm aware that they have spoken to the Town of North Hampton Selectmen, and 9 they've spoken to the North Hampton Water 10 11 So, even though those past Commission. 12 intervenors are not present today, they are still aware of the case and have another way 13 of contacting the Company. So I just wanted 14 to put that on the record. 15 16 Yes, there are some nuances 17 with this particular rate case, such as

WICA, that Staff will need to review. But other than that, Staff will be conducting its usual rate case review, and it will be prepared to make its recommendations on the issues at the time it files testimony in a procedural schedule that it hopes to work out with the Company and intervenors during

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the technical session.

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As usual, Staff will be 2 conducting an audit of the Company's books 3 for the test year. As the record -- or as 4 the filing indicated, there were \$4.5 5 million worth of plant additions that will 6 7 need to be audited to make sure they are used and useful and in service. There are 8 pro forma adjustments that were made in the 9 filing, and Staff will be scrutinizing those 10 as well. 11

The Company has asked for a 12 10.25 percent on equity, and Staff will be 13 reviewing that. We note that there is no 14 cost-of-equity expert, which is good for 15 rate case expenses, but it makes it a little 16 difficult for Staff to look at the reasoning 17 behind the 10.25 request. However, Staff 18 feels comfortable that during discovery 19 we'll be able to suss out documentation to 20 21 establish why the Company's requesting that. 22 Staff will be reviewing the new Town of Hampton right-of-way tax. 23 This is something we're not familiar with, and 24

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1 we'll be inquiring of the Company, as well as the Town, as to the justification, the 2 legal justification for that tax. 3 Aquarion has requested special 4 5 accounting treatment. It requests that the expense associated with the right-of-way tax 6 7 be considered a deferred asset, along with the amount for the 2012 portion of the tax, 8 until temporary rates are granted. Aquarion 9 seeks to amortize this expense over three 10 years, and so Staff will be paying special 11 attention to that treatment and will offer 12 an opinion at a later date. 13 14 Aquarion has conducted a customer-service satisfaction survey. 15 Staff will be conducting discovery into that 16 17 survey. We're pleased that, according to the filing, that it reported good results. 18 Now as to the WICA. 19 In 20 looking back at the past order approving the 21 WICA -- that was Order 25,019, and that was 22 in Aquarion's last rate case back in 2008 -there were some threshold criteria to review 23 the WICA by, and Staff will be looking at 24

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1 that criteria. What Staff culled out of the prior order were the goals were to promote 2 the investment of infrastructure 3 replacement. So we'll be looking at that. 4 It was to have a goal of mitigating rate 5 shock, and Staff will be looking at whether 6 7 WICA has reduced rate shock. Of course, there are other variables, other pressures 8 driving rate increases. So it may be a 9 10 little difficult to cull those out. But 11 we'll be looking at whether it was effective at reducing rate shock. We will be looking 12 at whether the program helped reduce lost 13 water and unaccounted-for water, and whether 14 it addressed needed non-revenue-producing 15 16 assets, asset additions on a timely basis. In the last rate case, the 17 Company had directed Staff to the 18 Connecticut WICA model, and Staff will be 19 20 checking in with Connecticut just to see how 21 WICA worked for that state, just to 22 thoroughly look at all information available 23 to us as we render an opinion on the usefulness of WICA. 24

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1 Lastly, with respect to the temporary rate relief, Staff has reviewed 2 the filing. We don't have a position on 3 temporary rates yet. But we know that there 4 are some holes in the filing that we are 5 certain will be cured with some discovery 6 7 responses. So we will be sitting down with the Company during the technical session to 8 discuss some of the discovery questions that 9 we have. 10 11 And other than that, we expect to coordinate with the Company and the 12 13 intervenors in a proposed procedural schedule and a technical session, and we 14 will file that shortly. Thank you. 15 16 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Thank you. Commissioner Harrington. 17 CMSR. HARRINGTON: Yes, just a 18 19 comment that I would hope people would look 20 into during the discovery and tech session, 21 is that it appears that what the Company has 22 stated is sort of in a downward spiral here. You're seeing your consumption of water go 23 down due to energy efficiency -- or water 24

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efficiency or more efficient appliance, and also because of people being more aware of, you know, using less natural resources. But now you're asking for another increase, which, of course, is only going to make people more aware of their need to use less water, which will drive down the amount they use, and you're sort of in a downward spiral there.

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So, rather than just go 10 11 forward and say continue the same ole, same ole, I really think it's time to start 12 looking at this and say: What do we need to 13 14 do differently? Does the Company need to change the way they look at things? 15 I think this is a -- and I put this challenge to all 16 17 parties, that continuing granting a rate increase based on revenue needs, based on 18 19 how things were done in the past, is only 20 going to head us down that downward spiral, 21 and you'll be back here in a couple of years 22 saying usage has continued to go down even more, so we need to raise our rates even 23 more. And there's got to be some 24

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1 alternative to that. So I hope all parties will look into that. And also, realizing 2 that the tax issue is not the major part of 3 it, but 16 percent of it being attributed to 4 taxes is also a thing that I think the Town 5 needs to look at a little bit and saying if 6 7 you're going to put a lot of taxes on the 8 Company, you've got to expect them to pass those through in the rates. 9 So, just some issues I hope 10 11 people will look at during the discovery. 12 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: All right. Ms. Thunberg, yes. 13 14 MS. THUNBERG: May Staff just respond to one of the points that 15 16 Commissioner Harrington --17 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Certainly. MS. THUNBERG: -- made about 18 19 water usage or consumption declining? Staff is aware that this is an 20 issue that not only Aquarion is facing, but 21 22 it's a issue that the Pennichuck Companies are facing and other water utilities are 23 facing. So, yes, it's definitely on our 24 12-085} [Prehearing Conference] {07-11-12}

1 radar screen. And thank you for making note of that. 2 3 CMSR. HARRINGTON: Good. CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: All right. 4 Anything further? 5 (No verbal response) 6 7 CHAIRMAN IGNATIUS: Nothing else from the Commissioners. 8 9 I think the next thing, then, will be we will close the formal part of 10 11 this proceeding and ask you to stay and work on initial discovery, discussion of the 12 13 issues and development of a procedural schedule. If Staff can notify us of the 14 results of that, we'd appreciate that. And 15 16 otherwise, we will adjourn this session and wait to hear from you on the outcome of the 17 technical session. Thank you. 18 (Hearing adjourned at 10:27 a.m.) 19 20 21 22 23 24
