Good morning Barbara,

Don't forget to send me the word version of part one if you can.

As for the idea of putting a threshold on the rebate program so that some installations are ineligible for the program and thus eligible for any RFP process, I think we need to think in terms of what will get the largest numbers of units installed in the short and long term. My best guess as to a job price that will make this happen is \$200,000. In other words, pellet boiler installations with a total installed cost of under \$200,000 should be eligible. Larger installations should not be eligible.

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
