ORDER OF NOTICE

On January 25, 2016, Aquarion Water Company of New Hampshire (Aquarion) filed with the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (Commission) a request to change the way it bills certain customers. The petition and subsequent docket filings, other than any information for which confidential treatment is requested of or granted by the Commission; will be posted to the Commission's website at http://www.puc.nh.gov/Regulatory/Dockethk/2016/16-128/hmml.

Aquarion serves approximately 9,000 customers in the towns of Hampton, North; Hampton, and Rye. Aquarion bills metered and private fire customers on a quarterly basis, in advance of providing, service, and requires payment from the customers within 30 days. Aquarion also charges the same monthly customer charge to all customers, regardless of the number of days within the billing period.

Pursuant to RSA 378:1, Aquarion seeks permission to change from quarterly billing to monthly billing for metered and private fire customers, on a service rendered basis beginning May 1, 2016. Aquarion also proposes to switch billing its service charges from in-advance to in-arrears; to change its payment due date from 30 days to 25 days; and to change from a uniform monthly customer charge to a customer charge calculated on a per diem basis depending on the number of days in the billing cycle. Additionally, Aquarion asks to defer its recovery of working capital related to the proposed billing changes, approximately \$23,000, until the company's next rate case. Aquarion contends that the changes are authorized by RSA 378:1 and are consistent with the public good for a number of reasons. Aquarion expects the costs of the proposed changes to be autwelghed by the benefits to the company and customers.

The filing raises, inter ana, issues related to RSA 378:1 et seq. and whether Aquarion's proposed changes to the way it collects charges for services from customers are just and reasonable. Each party has the right to have an attorney represent the party at the party's own expense.

Based upon the foregoing, it is

ORDERED, that a Prehearing Conference pursuant to N.H. Code Admin. Rules Puc 203.15, be held before the Commission located at 21 S. Fruit St., Suite 10, Concord, New Hampshire on April 7, 2016 at 1:30 - p.m., at which each party will provide a preliminary statement of its position with regard to the petition and any of the issues set forth in N.H. Code Admin. Rules Puc 203.15; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that, immediately following the Prehearing Conference, Aquarion, the Staff of the Commission and any intervenors hold a Technical Session to review the petition and allow Aquarion to provide any amendments or updates to its filing; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that pursuant to N.H. Code Admin. Rules Puc 203:12, Aquarion shall notify all persons destring to be heard at this hearing by publishing a copy of this Order of Notice no later than March 23, 2016, in a newspaper with general circulation in those portions of the state in which operations are conducted, publication to be documented by affidavit filed with the Commission on or before April 4, 2016; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that consistent with N.H. Code Admin. Rules Puc 203.17 and Puc 203.02, any party seeking to intervene in the proceeding shall submit to the Commission seven copies of a Petition to Intervene with copies sent to Aquarton and the Office of the Consumer Advocate on or before April 4, 2016, such Petition stating the facts demonstrating how its rights, duties, privileges, immunities or other substantial interest may be affected by the proceeding, as required by N.H. Code Admin. Rule Puc 203.17 and RSA 541-A:32, I(b); and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that any party objecting to a Petition to Intervene make said Objection on or before April 7, 2016.

Town awarded grant to continue cleanup

Route 1 businesses to install treatment systems for Spruce Creek

KITTERY, Maine - The KITTERY, Maine — The town was again awarded a grant to continue with the Spruce Creek Watershed Restoration Project that has been working to identify and been working to identify and mitigate polluted stormwater runoff and bacteria sources entering into Spruce Creek in Kittery. High concentrations of bac-

teria in the water levels in the creek have kept the area closed to shellfish harvesting since 2005 and a series of grants from the Environmental Protection Agency's Clean Water Act Section 319 grant program has enabled workers from the

Spruce Creek Association to erties. The recent funding is the fourth phase of the funding; projects for the third phase of funding took place last year. This year's grant will pro-

vide funding to install localized stormwater treatment systems at two businesses along Route 1 as well as assist with stormwater management on residential properties, said Kittery's shoreline resource

officer Jessa Kellogg.

"We are trying to capture stormwater that is going down the street and filter and treat it before it gets to Spruce Creek," she said. "As (water) runs over pavement it collects

An installation of a bioretention system is planned at the Kittery Trading Post on

Spruce Creek Association to add systems in the watershed area to treat runoff water on ants. Another systems is to be oboth public and private propmium Outlets, also on Route 1. This will be a subsurface gravel wetland installed in the ditch alongside McDonald's, Kel-logg said. A third retrofit is also planned, but the location

has yet to be finalized. The grant will also allow project staff to provide home-owners in the watershed area technical assistance and recommend site specific stormwater conservation practices at no cost to the

omeowner. While the town and the Spruce Creek Watershed Association have made strides in reducing the amount of harmful bacteria entering into the water, there continues to be hot spots of high concen-trations of bacteria.

"There are still some unan-swered questions," Kellogg

Most of the unanswered questions are the sources of bacteria. Since water often does not flow in a straight line, it can be difficult to know where water picked up pollutants. Oily run off or a failing septic can be some of

Since the restoration efforts began in 2008, there has been 64 projects completed, Kel-logg said. This has led to the yearly reduction of five tons of sediment, 15 pounds of phos-phorus, 115 pounds of nitrogen and removal of 567 billion bac-terial colonies.

While the improvements to the creek has raised the water quality of certain parts of the creek to meet the state criteria for reopening shellfish harvesting, the Maine Division of Marine Services has told

the town the area cannot be reopened to shellfish harvest-ing until Portsmouth upgrades their water treatment facility to meet EPA guidelines. Kellogg said. The plant has violated the Clean Water Act

since 1985.

"We are anxiously waiting for Portsmouth to do that," Kellogg said.

The Spruce Creek Watershed drains about 9.8 square miles, in Kittery and Eliot. About 90 percent of the watershed is in Kittery, according to the Spruce Creek Association website.

School Administrative District 35 receives increased state subsidy

District to receive additional \$348K

SOUTH BERWICK, Maine School Administrative - School Administrative District 35 was granted a \$348,358 subsidy increase for its fiscal year 2017 budget, thanks in part to state legislative actions

The announcement was The announcement was made by Superintendent Mary Nash during the district's School Board meeting. Wednesday, March 16.

The increased funds came from two sources, according to Nash. The first involved the district's claim that

the district's claim that \$475,000 of a \$1,041,542 planned reduction in state Board of Education subsidies was due to data system miscalculations. Consequently, \$141,666 was returned to the district by the state.

The second source involved the Legislature's passage of an additional \$15 million in subsidy aid to local schools for next year's budget. Of this amount, the Marshwood school district will receive \$206,692. As to what will be done

with this money, Nash summarized three top priorities reviewed with the district's reviewed with the district's school principals earlier in the evening. Selectmen decline to take a side in development dispute

Approval of elderly housing subdivision under appeal

ELIOT, Maine - The Select Board on Thursday decided to take no action on the town's role in legal action against a Board of

Appeals decision.

The Select Board made its decision after a conference call in executive session with legal counsel

At issue was a Board of Adjustment decision in January in which the BOA sided with abut-ters in an administrative appeal against the Plan-ning Board granting approval of an elderly housing subdivision. In December, the Planning Board gave final approval for the Libbey elderly housing project on about 78 acres at 1372 State Road, across from town offices.

Applicant and devel-oper Joseph Falzone of Stratham, New Hamp-shire, and owner Barbara Libbey of Eliot, have filed a Rule 80B (review of government action) complaint

The Planning Board granted waivers to exempt a sewer requirement and to increase the unit size. Town ordinances require town water and town sewer for elderly housing projects, and limit the maximum square footage of the units.

In January, Judith Hilt, the Hilt Family Trust, Orland McPherson, James W. McPherson and Lynn w. McPherson and Lynn McPherson, all abutters of the subdivision, filed an administrative appeal on the Planning Board's approval with the BOA.

Attorney Matthew D. Manahan of Pierce Atwood represented the appellants at the January BOA meet-ing. He presented a list of 12 items where he said the Planning Board erred in Planning Board erred in approving the subdivision. His assertions included that the subdivision was not elderly housing but purposed to avoid the growth ordinance; the subdivision would have an adverse effect on a historic site; the board waived the maximum floor area for elderly housing structures without explanation; and the board waived the

requirement for connec-tion to town sewer. Town Planning Assis-tant Kate Pelletier answered for the Plan-ning Board. She took Manahan's points one by one and said the Planning Board has no authority to define elderly housing, that several aspects of building the subdivision cern of the code enforcement officer, not the Planning Board. She said a historical site report

was not relevant because there is no historic site. A report submitted by the Historical Society on the Historical society on Libbey Lane, an old road in the lot, was not read by and was rejected by the Planning Board. Resident Jennifer

Fox said elderly hous-Fox said elderly hous-ing projects receive a "density bonus" because of the sewer connec-tion requirement. The Planning Board waived the sewer requirement and the waiv not substantiated, she said.

Board of Adjustment members ruled three of Manahan's points were valid arguments: that the subdivision did not meet the definition of elderly housing, that the Planning Board did not consider evidence of adverse effect on a historical site and that the board did not have jurisdiction to waive the maximum floor requirement for elderly housing. The board voted 3-0 to

approve the appeal.

Work to save mother earth

In 1973, the National Asso-iation of Extension Home Economists honored Ruth for her pioneering recycling efforts. She was one of eight recipients of the prestigious Florence Hall Award, which recognizes those who imple-ment outstanding responses to emerging issues

"Since I knew Florence, "Since I knew Florence, it was a real pleasure," Ruth says. A former field agent with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Florence Hall initiated the award with a \$200 grant to be used by the recipient for professional

Ruth received the award Ruth received the award for her Solid Waste Disposal Project, which she had been conducting in Rockingham County. Ruth traveled to Liberty, N.Y. and gave a presentation about her project to 1,500 fellow Extension Home 1,500 fellow Extension Home Economists. "It was one of the highlights of my profes-sional career," she says. Ruth included her speech, which she noted was limited

to three minutes, in her auto-

biography. Here is how she began, and concluded. "Solid waste disposal is a real down to earth project. Each of us has to dispose of about 5 pounds daily, or 1,525 pounds a year. Multiply that by the number of people in pounds a year. Multiply that by the number of people in your town or city. It's a stag-gering community problem that must be handled in a sanitary manner. Otherwise air, water and land pollution problems will result

Solid waste disposal in a Solid waste disposal in a sanitary manner is critical in every community, small or large, today and every day in the future. If every one of us adopts the simple truth: 'I can help save our Earth,' we can achieve much together: Extension Home Economists working with and encourag-

working with and encourag-ing concerned citizens. It hope you're willing to try." Ruth developed a score-card to help towns rate the effectiveness of their waste disposal. It was part of the information on waste man-agement that Ruth provided to homemaker and other



women's groups, students, ecology-minded organi-zations and professional

"A point system, based on US Public Health Standards, focused the public's attention on their local site: its access road, the presence or lark of a supervisor, transportation methods for refuse, compact-ing methods for refuse, compacting methods, and covering the refuse with dirt daily.

refuse with dirt daily.

"Prohibition of scavenging aroused much discussion as well as the need for a fence, gate, fire protection and an outdoor shelter for employees. Disposition of trees, large appliances, and septic tank effluents were scored along with insect and rodent control. The results indicated the average site was a DUMP: a location where refuse was left uncovered for more than a week. Such a dump is unac-ceptable by public health standards."

Ruth's reach extended far and wide. She taught many classes on waste handling. She conducted an ecology symposium at Pease Air Force Base, and the Air Force flew

Base, and the Air Force flew personnel in from other air bases to take part.

She encouraged people to consider waste disposal alternatives: Sanitary land-fill with daily compacting and earth cover; incinera-tion costs with various types of burners; composting, and tion costs with various types of burners; composting, and shredding vegetative matter, and sorting in one's home and recycling reusable materials. Ruth mobilized local citi-

rens, public officials and the New England Telephone Co. to collect out-of-date tele-phone books, which resulted in the recycling of some

in a 1973 article the Man In a 1973 article the Man-chester Union Leader reported, "Recycling of paper and compositing have increased, and collection cen-ters for glass, paper and steel containers are now being set up in the county."

she received a note from Elizshe received a note from Elizabeth Keenan, one of her Girl Scott examiners and a member of the Girl Scott Council, about Ruth's advocacy for recycling, "lust cannot tell you how proud lam of you!" wrote Elizabeth. "In Girl Scouting I knew you had an interesting future in store..."

Battling mosquitoes in town

Ruth started lobbying for leg-islation to create mosquito control districts. In 1065. the state law was passed, b Hampton didn't take action until 1973, when ther

It was Ruth's one to renew her fight, using the Exten-sion Service's motto to learn by doing.

"County citizens needed to learn how to petition to form a mosquito control district under New Hampshire law. The mechanism was there The mechanism was there, but lying dormant. I tried out the process step by step as a citizen of Hampton before I publicized the details."

In 1975 the town approved a mosquito control district, with a \$10,000 badget, under the direction of a commission, with Ruth as Chair.

Hecause mosquitoes travel from town to town, Ruth pushed for a regional approach to mosquito abate-

ent in the many talks she ve throughout Rockingham gave throughout Rockingham County. By 1975, ten other towns had also created mosquito control districts.

Always the educator, Ruth

applied for and received a \$500 Innovative Award from the Extension Service to develop materials about mosquito control.
