11	the EERS 2020 Plan Update review and approval
12	process. We look forward to engaging in this
13	process at the next opportunity to do so.

16	MR. DEXTER: You're welcome.
17	CMSR. GIAIMO: All right. Let's go
18	with preliminary positions.

21	MR. FOSSUM: Thank you, and good
22	morning.
23	We are here today, as has been noted,
24	to review and, hopefully, ultimately approve

the 2020 Update Plan that has been filed by the utilities relative to the three-year EERS Plan that was previously approved by the Commission.

I wanted to note that some years ago my daughter participated in gymnastics. And, while we were there, in the parent viewing area, there was a very prominently displayed sign to remind the parents that -- it said that "Comparison is the thief of joy."

And the point of that was to make sure that the people who are viewing took into account that, you know, different children mature in different ways, have different levels of interest and skill and ability. And that we shouldn't be distracted by those differences, but should instead look at the successes that our children are having.

I offer that little anecdote because I believe, based on some relatively recent information, it may be that people are looking to, perhaps, probably unfairly compare New Hampshire to what is going on in other places in the country. And I don't believe that comparison is particularly helpful. And I

believe a distraction of success that New Hampshire has seen since the implementation of the EERS.

This 2020 Update Plan continues the tradition that we have established under the EERS. We have set meaningful goals for energy efficiency, and we are continuing to meet them, to benefit the customers, the electric and gas customers of the State of New Hampshire.

This Plan Update moves us forward in that regard. It continues the successful programs that have been implemented. It offers a few adjustments where it seems appropriate, for instance, the Residential Demand Response offering that's included in the filing. We think this is a good plan, and we think it's a beneficial plan for New Hampshire.

Now, I know I said that we shouldn't compare. But, if we're going to do it anyway, I think it's important to have a complete view. And, in that regard, I wanted to thank the Commission for supporting this EERS over these last few years, because, without the support for these programs, it's possible that New

Hampshire might be further behind its peers
around the country.

That all said, we're prepared and we will, as we always have, to work cooperatively with the other stakeholders in this process expeditiously, to get this filing ready for 2020 implementation, to prepare for the real benefits to offer to New Hampshire customers, and to prepare for the real work that is to come with the new three-year plan next year.

So, with that, I would ask that the Commission approve this 2020 Update Plan, including the rate requests within it. And that it do so in enough time that we can continue these programs without interruption beginning January 1, 2020.

KREIS: Thank you. 6 So, my daughter is a dressage rider. 7 And this past summer she competed in the North 8 American Youth Championships down in suburban 9 New York City. And this is a big international 10 competition, she was very proud to participate 11 in it. And, lo and behold, when all was said 12 and done, she placed, I believe, sixth, in a 13 group of eight people that she was competing 14 with. And when she achieved that result, which 15 didn't result in, I quess, a championship for 16 her, I didn't hear her say "comparison is the 17 thief of joy". I heard her promise to be back 18 again in that competition in two years, so that 19 she can improve her result.

And, in that spirit, I am very committed, and the Office of the Consumer Advocate is very committed, to improving New Hampshire's record when it comes to energy efficiency. Not because we really care how we

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place in relation to other states, according to the American Council for an Energy Efficient Economy or according to anybody else's benchmarks, but because the citizens of this state and the ratepayers of this state deserve the achievement of what we have all already committed to achieve, which is all cost-effective energy efficiency. And we are throwing everything we have in the direction of making that a reality. We are not there yet.

Nevertheless, the 2020 Update is but one step on that path to all cost-effective energy efficiency. And, relative to the step that we'll be undertaking over the next six to nine months, I refer to the developing and filing of the next triennial plan covering 2021 through 2023, this proceeding that we're in right now is of relatively lesser magnitude. And, so, I do look forward to a swift and amicable resolution of any issues that might be raised by the utilities' filing, and a settlement agreement that the Commission can speedily approve.

Staff is generally supportive of the proposed Plan Update. There are a few issues that we will pay special attention to in the short time allowed by the procedural schedule. One of them is the proposed demand response initiatives put forth by the Company.

As you will recall from the last Plan Update, the utilities implemented a -- two of the utilities implemented a demand response initiative, targeted at commercial/industrial customers. The results of that program, according to the schedule we set out last time, have not yet been provided in detail. They will be provided shortly after -- early in 2020, is my understanding.

The Companies have proposed to extend that initiative in the 2020 year. And we're generally supportive of that. But we will be looking closely at the results that will be filed, even though that will come after this phase of the case is finished.

The utilities have recommended or proposed to extend demand response initiatives into the residential sector. So, that is an area that Staff will want to take a close look at.

And, probably more of an issue for the next triennium than this one, but the overall question of "whether or not demand reduction initiatives belong in the SBC-funded portion of a utility's operations versus some other area?" But, as I said, that's probably more of an issue for the next triennium.

Over the course of the last couple of years, the Lost Base Revenue Work Group concluded its work, submitted a report, and developed a framework by which lost base revenues would be collected. And those calculations are included in the filing that was made September 13th.

So, Staff will be looking to make sure that the calculations are in conformance with the report, the consensus report that was filed last year.

And this filing contains, for the

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1
         first time, the results of the Performance
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         Incentive Work Group. The recommendations of
 3
         the group are included in the filing, again, a
         largely consensus recommendation. And the
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         calculations presented in the September 13th
         filing reflect the results of that working
 6
 7
         group and that report. So, we'll just be
         making sure that everything lines up in that
 8
 9
         regard.

                   Other than those issues, we see this

         largely as a continuation of the Plan that has
