CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: Mr. Brown.

MR. BROWN: We just want to make sure the ratepayers are protected should FERC find that SB 365 is in violation of the law. You know, we want to make sure that something is in place so you're not trying to get the, I guess, genie back out of the bottle.

CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: Mr. Kreis.

MR. KREIS: Mr. Chairman, in the view of the Office of the Consumer Advocate, the Commission should be essentially doing nothing at this time pending the outcome of the FERC proceedings.

CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: Can we do that,
Mr. Kreis? I mean, I've got a law on the books
that tells certain entities to do things and
tells us to do something. If there's no
injunction stopping us, how do we not act?
Wouldn't we be subject to a pretty good

petition for writ of mandamus if we did
nothing?

MR. KREIS: I can't really speak to that, because I don't know who might file that writ, or where, or what standing they might have, or what court that might happen in.

CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: I think I'm looking at 72 pages that got filed yesterday that might give us a clue.

MR. KREIS: Okay. Well, you know, I think it's really -- you should ask those parties what they intend to do in the event that you do nothing.

What I know is that there is a serious proceeding pending before a federal decision-making body of competent jurisdiction that argues persuasively that this statute is unconstitutional, inconsistent with the United States Constitution. That is a serious question.

I do not think it's a question this Commission should get involved with addressing. And I don't know how you can move forward with implementing RSA 162-H [362-H?] without wading

1 into that question somehow. CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: Ms. Amidon. 2 MS. AMIDON: Staff has looked at the 3 statute. And I think the Commission has to 4 5 address a couple of questions. One of which 6 was raised by the motion that you received late 7 yesterday from the Woods, for lack of a better term, I'll call them the "Woods". And that is 8 whether that what you received from Eversource 9 10 complies with the statute. 11 And in addition, I think you need to 12 determine -- give me a moment, I lost my 13 thought. Wouldn't you know that. Well, I 14 think you need to determine the rate that would 15 apply to these, to these bids. 16 And also, I think, finally, determine 17 whether some of the other relief requested in 18 both the motion and the initial filing by 19 Eversource are things that you have authority 20 to grant. 21 CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: I mean, I think 22 the statute does leave a lot of things open. 23 MS. AMIDON: I would agree.

It only

CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG:

specifies a few terms, but they're pretty important terms. I think it does specify the rate. But I think there is a question about whether that includes capacity. I mean, I know that the Woods' motion raises the issue. I'm not sure it's as clear as they think it is.

I'm inclined to ask, Mr. Bersak, you and anyone else who wants to, to respond to the motion. The motion asks us to do a number of things in this proceeding, without a response, and trying to do it orally is both not fair and not going to be effective, I think it would be better for you to file a written response, and let others as well.

MR. BERSAK: It would be very much better, since I have not read the motion. I was not on the service list for this docket, because, as you may recall, originally, this docketed as a new docket. When it got pushed backed into this one, somehow my name didn't get added to the service list, so I was not aware of that motion until I sat down at this table an hour ago.

decision, given the fact that the procurement
is supposed to be coterminous with the default
service period, which begins February 1. So,
beyond that, I'm not quite sure how much we can
get done.

CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: No. But the last thing you said is very important, I think. And that is that, as you have a discussion after we leave about the schedule, somebody is going to need to open up a calendar and look at things and see when decisions would need to be made on what, in order for it to be effective for the February 1st rate period that we're talking about, right?

MS. AMIDON: Yes. And the other thing that's not clear to me, and I will just say this, it's on the basis of the statute, it

1 says that "be subject to review by the commission for conformity with this chapter", 2 3 doesn't really say it has to be part of a hearing. So, that suggests to me that the 4 Commission can review the filing, the eligible facility agreement, as the statute says, and 6 7 determine it conforms with the statute without a hearing. There's nothing that seems to 8 9 preclude that. 10 I would like to know what other 11 people's opinion of that is as well. Because 12 that would really constrain the Commission, if 13 it had to hold a hearing. 14 CHAIRMAN HONIGBERG: Does anyone want 15 to offer any up, a response to that now, or do 16 you just want to discuss it in the technical

session?
